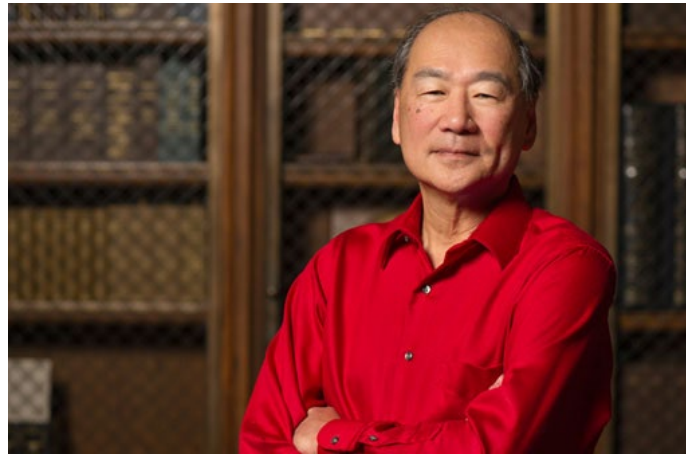

David T. Takeuchi, PhD



David T. Takeuchi, Ph.D., is currently Professor and Associate Dean for Faculty Excellence at the School of Social Work at the University of Washington and Professor in the Department of Sociology, Center for the Study of Demography and Ecology, and Center for the Statistics and Social Sciences. His research focuses on the social, structural, and cultural contexts that are associated with different health outcomes, especially among racial and ethnic minorities. He has conducted some of the largest studies on Asian Americans including the National Latino and Asian American Study (with Margarita Alegria). He has published in a wide range of journals in sociology, public health, psychology, medicine, psychiatry, and health services. He received the Innovations Award from the National Institute on Health and Health Disparities for his research contributions, the Leonard Pearlin Award for distinguished Contributions to the Sociology of Mental Health, and the Distinguished Contributions to the Study of Asian Americans. He is also a past recipient of the Marsha Landolt Distinguished Mentor Award. He is an elected member of the Washington State Academy of Sciences, the Sociological Research Association, and the American Academy of Social Work and Social Welfare. He served on the National Academy of Science panel on the integration of immigrants into American society and currently serves on the Committee on Populations for the National Academy of Sciences.
